creates for her a fictional childhood adolescence and old age she turns her into what she calls a sort of female hero an epic heroine like the legendary nanny of the maroons who schooled in the sorcery and magical ritual of obeah is arrested for healing members of the family that owns her rich with postmodern irony the novel even includes an encounter with hester prawn of hawthorne's scarlet letter conde breaks new ground in both style and content

while rejecting a conception of literature as moral philosophy or a device for imparting particular morals to the reader through exemplary characters and plots maryse conde has displayed throughout her writing career a strong valorization of literature as ethical critique this study examines her singular approach to literary commitment as a critical reworking of aesthetic models and modes of interpretation focusing on four dominant problematics in conde's work history and globalization in *la belle creole* and *moi tituba sorciere noire de salem* intertextuality and reception in *la migration des c urs* and *celanire cou coupe* trauma and subjectivity in *en attendant le bonheur* and *desirada* community and ethics in *traversee de la mangrove* and *histoire de la femme cannibale* this analysis proposes to elucidate how and to what ends conde engages and alters approaches to reading staging the problematic yet pragmatic need to read well this hermeneutic imperative foregrounds the need to engage with texts to cannibalize texts while recognizing their fundamental opacity and inexhaustibility their resistance to the reader's interpretive habits nicole simek is an assistant professor of foreign languages and literatures at whitman college specializing in french caribbean literature simek's research interests include the intersection of politics and literature in caribbean fiction trauma theory and sociological approaches to literature table of contents acknowledgments introduction interpreting through example chapter 1 reading history the example of the past after globalization chapter 2 rising with the canon insolent imitation parodic intertextuality chapter 3 writing violence collective traumas singular pasts chapter 4 the cannibal reader digesting the other interpreting community conclusion comme un indien tupinamba bibliography index

this book is an exploration of the life and art of maryse condé who first won international acclaim for *segú* a novel about west african experience and the slave trade born in guadeloupe in 1937 condé lived in guinea after it won its independence from france later she lived in ghana and senegal during turbulent decisive moments in the histories of these countries her writings novels plays essays stories and children's books have led her to an increasingly important role within africa and throughout the world frangoise pfaff met maryse condé in 1981 when she first interviewed her their friendship grew quickly in 1991 the two women continued recording conversations about condé's geographical sojourns and literary paths her personality and her thoughts their conversations reveal connections between condé's vivid art and her eventful passionate life in her encounters with historical and literary figures and in her opinions on politics and culture condé appears as an engaging witness to her time the conversations frequently sparkle with humor at other moments they are infused with profound seriousness maryse condé is the recipient of the french literary awards *le grand prix littéraire de la femme* and *le prix de l'académie française* she currently teaches at columbia university and her most recent works include *tree of life* and *crossing the mangrove* born and educated in paris frangoise pfaff is a professor of french at howard university the translator of this book she is also the author of twenty five black african filmmakers a critical study with filmography and bio bibliography and the cinema of ousmane sembène a pioneer of african cinema *entretiens avec maryse condé* was first published in france in 1993

relations between women like the branches and roots of the mangrove twist around across and within others as they pervade caribbean letters desire between women in caribbean literature elucidates the place of desire between women in caribbean letters compelling readers to rethink how to read the structures and practices of sexuality

ancestral voices healing narratives female ghosts in contemporary us and caribbean fiction examines four novels by erna brodber zoé valdés sandra cisneros and maryse condé in this unique comparative analysis kristina s gibby explores the significance of female ghosts specifically maternal figures who haunt female narrators inspiring them to transcribe the dead's obfuscated histories and recover their family memory the author argues that these female ghosts subvert historiographic power structures through a matrilineal

succession of knowledge via oral traditions of storytelling inevitably broadening historical consciousness and asserting the value of fiction in the face of historical rupture gibby contends that in form and content these novels disrupt patriarchal and western expectations of time and epistemology they favor cyclical temporality highlighted by the spirits uncanny return which underscores relational understanding and challenges the exclusive and limiting constraints of linear time this book makes important contributions to inter american literary criticism with its narrow focus on female authors who confront the horrors of history through maternal spirits

thesis m a from the year 2005 in the subject american studies literature grade 2 3 ernst moritz arndt university of greifswald language english abstract the paper is concerned with the depiction of black women s subjugation and resistance in fiction it examines the quality of black women s suffering through racism and sexism especially within the system of slavery in america from the 17th to the 19th century moreover the paper contrasts black women s status in and after slavery this is done on the one hand in order to illustrate and underline slavery s inhuman conditions black women suffered from and on the other hand to show the continuation of racism and sexism after slavery it will be revealed that the assumed changes of conditions for black women nowadays are rather superficial and that discrimination and inequality compared to men and white people have been persisting the study is based on the novels beloved and sula by toni morrison and on maryse condé s novel i tituba black witch of salem these three novels are selected as basis for the analysis because they depict black people s oppression in several forms intensities and times and focus especially on women s particular situation it will be discussed how blacks were capable at all to endure and survive the physical and mental tortures of captivity in slavery or of discrimination and inequality after slavery connected with this question the role of the african culture is debated here attention is turned to the authors african roots and the question how much these roots inspired the elements of the actions and in what respect african tradition and beliefs are interwoven in the books being further backing aspects for the novels women human interpersonal relationships and collectivity are examined connected with a consideration of the novels investigation and analysis of human nature psyche and emotions here the analysis focuses on questions that are essential for an entire comprehension of the books for example how are feelings especially love presented

and which special functions do they fulfill in the works what significance do the various interpersonal relationships have to what extent are they cores of resistance what causes the significance of female friendships what differentiates female suffering from male this paper claims to elucidate the profound meaning morrison s and condé s insights into black women s present and past provide and their works potential to be far more than just entertaining pieces of magic realism
